


The closing prayer was led by Louie Trujillo and the meeting adjourned @ 8:30 PM.










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Station #1 Bunkroom - 1957



"Roadie" The Leroy Barboa Story

Barboa, Leroy Leroy's career started at the Albuquerque Fire Academy March 1972 he retired July 1992. The academy training staff consisted of Chief Joe Maldonado, Captain Joe Gonzales and adjunct instructor Herman Bishop.

Leroy said our fire cadet class had graduation ceremonies at the Civic Auditorium which was torn down a few years later, I think that a lot of people do not remember the civic. I was proud to hear that Captain Joe Gonzales after retirement moved to California to be close to family and was employed at Disneyland and held the position of Fire Marshall.

Our fire cadet class had 27 cadets, some of my old classmates were Fred Teupell, Phil Lovato, Pat Cano, Cornie Padilla, James Gallegos, Robert Otero, Albert Lavine and Chuck Norine, Chuck was the smartest guy in our class. As cadets we did everything that we were told, it was strange one morning when the captain said, who would like to go help fight a fire that is in progress? Without hesitation we all raised our hands in excitement. Well we were loaded up on the academy pumper and off to the Rio Grande river to fight the river fire. We were all pumped up to fight the fire however after 8 hours of chocking smoke, mud, mosquitoes, dragging, wet heavy hose, covered with mud and stickers the excitement was lost. The next day the question was asked again this time only 1-2 hands went up, most just kind of looked down, the captain said OK wonderful let's go back to the river and away we went. As luck would have it our academy pumper broke down and we had to push the relic across the bridge trying to get some speed to pop the clutch to start it but it never got started, until the mechanic arrived. That was an experience I never forgot.

After graduation Leroy's first assignment was Engine 11 the crew consisted of Lieutenant Joe Hernandez, Shirley Stanley, Tony Anaya and Arthur Pittsford what you would call a "down to earth crew"! Leroy's was transferred to Station three where there was a big change in what Leroy was used to. Albert Tuepell was the House Captain, other firefighters were Doug Sieben, Dave Villanueva and Purple to name a few. Every shift I would think what's in store today? I still laugh about things that happened back then and some stories I did not share with my family. While at station three our platoon had several house fires and the dumpster fires on Katheryn SE, but no large fires.

I was a pipemen at station one when we had the Savoya Hotel fire it was a 3rd alarm fire. The multistory building was old and we had a lot of water flowing, trying to put the fire out, I was on a deluge gun when I heard a large crushing and rumble sound, one side of the building collapsed, firefighters were running out of the way to safety however the wall caught Fred Teupell, Fred was buried under the wall, firefighters dropped their hose lines and ran to the aid of Fred and started lifting and pulling debris to get Fred out which they did, that was a frightening situation. It was so cold that night the hose was frozen we could not roll it up we had to fold it. The stuff dripping from our noses quickly turned in to icicles. One thing that

caught my eye was, the drivers were in the cab of the fire trucks dry and warm, that was all the incentive I needed to study hard for the next drivers test. Heck the only thing keeping us kind of warm was the fire we were putting out.

Roadie Leroy Barboa

Leroy said I was promoted to driver and was assigned to station four, where the station crew had a big sense of humor so to speak. The station consisted of, Eddie Brieto, Chato, Doughnuts, Phil Vigil, King Farouk, Baldie and Eddie Torres to name a few. I also drove engine one for a while.

Leroy was asked about other assignments he had in his career, Leroy said I think at one time or another you need a change of scenery so to speak, and a position in the Fire Marshalls Office (FMO) became available so I transferred into FMO where I reported to Assistant Chief Erasmo Garza. The first two weeks in FMO was reading and studying the Life Safety Code and many other ordinances. I thought what did I get myself into, read, read and read. However, things fell into place when I was sent to the field to conduct inspections. My assignments were health care and correction facilities. At the correctional facilities the Department of Justice conducted routine inspections, so it was not difficult to inspect. Nursing homes and hospitals seemed to have the same violations, fire doors leading to the corridor propped open with a door stop (wedge) and of course improper use of extension cords. It was an ongoing lecture in telling the employees about fire and smoke spread that could occur with these doors propped open. The wedge issue was taken care of quickly but follow up inspection could find the doors propped open again. I retired from the fire department with FMO being my last assignment.

After retirement I did the normal things around the house after breaking things I was trying to fix, I thought maybe I should work a few hours part time somewhere? I was told that a local health care facility with a lot of LOVE needed a safety officer which would fit my background perfectly, so I applied and was given the position. It was so different from FMO code enforcement because in private industry things do not get corrected real fast if it is going to cost money. Not use to this type of enforcement pertaining to life safety so I resigned. I had many jobs and a stack of W-9 forms Leroy said which employment was short term at many places because if the job was not appealing and was boring I left and waited for my monthly check from PERA. One day I ran into Shirley Stanley retired firefighter who said, A local company who handles transporting of show equipment is always in need of drivers. Shirley said go get trained on semi-truck driving and get your Commercial Driver License (CDL), now that sounded exciting so I did.

Leroy received his CDL and was hired to drive eighteen-wheeler around the country. Leroy said the trailer I was pulling had big sound systems and lighting for shows. I found out; when touring with the music industry you are referred to as a ROADIE, so I was a roadie it has some flair in it. At the start I did not recognize some of the entertainers by name and they were big time stars. Some shows were one-night performances and others could be a one or two-week show. I would even function as what in the fire service we called a go-for but was called a Runner. Leroy said. There were trips to the east coast and Florida which took about 2 and one-half days of driving because driving hours were limited to 10 hours a day. Roadies could get a big fine if they were caught exceeding the 10-hour limit. One thing you had to do back then was study the road map before you were on the road, GPS was just starting to make its debut.

Another title that I worked under was "423 Stage Hand", which was getting the set ready for the performance. If you were getting the set ready food was provided to keep the employees together and finish the set fast. The food provided was always good and a lot of it.

I remember going to a show in New Orleans at the Superdome I drove the rig into the dome which would be the football field, the crews started to unload the contents which was not my job, so while waiting I went to the top section in the dome, looking down the 18-wheeler that I drove into the dome, it looked like a Tonka Truck from way up there. I wondered how could people watch a game from way up there? I would bet the players looked like ants.

Leroy said talking about unique events I was doing shows on the west coast one day it all changed every one's lifestyle. On September 11, (9/11) we had finished a show in Santa Clara and ready to head to the next one in San Francisco. That morning I was ready to eat breakfast and check out when I noticed people gathered around the television and many guests were checking out of the hotel quickly. The TV showed a tower on fire and I thought a high-rise fire, but then a plane hit the second tower. People viewing the TV coverage were upset, I called my boss who told me to continue on to San Francisco, so I did. My wife Theresa was going to fly from Albuquerque and meet me in San Francisco.

Arriving into the Bay area which is a highly populated area normally busy and congested was silent, I had to use the Bay Bridge to cross over, I was the only vehicle on the bridge, when I crossed over the bridge there were police and military personnel just waiting with their weapons drawn.

In the downtown area streets were empty just like watching an old black and white monster movie where people left before the monster arrived. The feeling I had was un-describable I guess just weird. I parked the rig checked into the hotel called the boss who said just head home, everything has been cancelled indefinitely. Theresa's flight and the entire country were cancelled.

As a roadie, I would also function as a driver or I guess you could say a chauffeur. in other cities or in Albuquerque mainly for the state fair. I would also take or pick up stars from the airport. A lot of the chauffeuring was driving the entertainers into Tingly Coliseum arena to perform. The star would ride in the convertible sitting on top of the back seat as we entered from the rodeo chute area I would drive in a full circle by the grandstands, the entertainer would wave at the audience until I stopped at the revolving stage where they got out and onto the stage. I remember once the revolving stage got stuck and for some reason Glenn Campbell got real upset muttering some choice words as he was waving to the crowds.

Leroy said I was given solid instructions if anyone jumps down from the grandstands, tell the entertainer "we are gone" and take off out of the coliseum fast don't stop at the revolving stage. Guess what, I was driving Willie Nelson into the arena when 3 guys jumped out of the stands to try and shake his hand and maybe climb into the limo, so I yelled "we are gone" he said WOOPIE- WOOPIE as we sped off spinning the tires to get out of the arena fast, now that was fun for me and Willie!

Another star I drove around Leroy said was Garth Brooks he would sit down and eat and talk with everyone. He was one that I would say was the most enjoyable entertainer to be around, nice guy. Leroy said roadie's shared things with one another so when Alan Jackson was on tour his motor home had a trailer it pulled. I asked his driver about the trailer, he said let me show you the inside. There were 4 HOGS as Alan Jackson called them (AKA Harley Davidsons). Alan would have one of his hogs unloaded and take off riding anytime anyplace for hours. He said many people did not recognize him on the streets riding his bike. Leroy said another star I enjoyed was Neil Diamond, I picked him up at the airport after the introductions Neil said I am hungry and want to eat. Sure, thing what would you like? Turns out he wanted a particular chain restaurant that severed health type foods. The best I could do was take him to a health food store on Carlisle and Indian School that had a big arrow in the parking lot, I said this is the best I can think of for now, he said OK. When he came out he said I am good now ready to work. One thing was it appeared no one recognized him in the store.

Leroy said another star Rick Trevino was here to do a show and he brought his father with him and I was their driver. Rick said we need to eat and we need a place where they serve menudo, so that was easy to find. They were real friendly to me and everyone.

We went to many cities for shows where I met stars like Janet Jackson who had a beautiful singing voice. While we were all eating lunch together before a practice session I did not recognize the person sitting next to me it was Carlos Santana. When they started to rehearse songs, it blew me away then I knew who he was. Leroy said always one in the crowd an entertainer who kept his distance from everyone and

appeared to be a little demanding, was "Prince", so I never talked to him.

One weird trip was driving the Moscow Circus from Cincinnati to New Jersey. The trailer I was pulling had animals in it and the workers rode inside with them, I though part of the special treatment for the animals because PITA an animal rights group was watching them carefully. Well not the case of them being nice to the animals it was because they were cheap and would not spend their money on travel. That PITA group was powerful I was climbing into my rig to leave when one person from PITA said "have a safe trip Leroy". Surprised the heck out of me, they knew everything about all hired personnel.

I was a runner when the WWE Wrestling Federation did a show here in Albuquerque. One skit was a wrestler was going to propose to his girlfriend so they wanted him dressed up like John Travolta in Saturday Night Fever, disco style. I went to many stores and found nothing however I tried some thrift stores where I found things that could work, not perfect but it worked. You never knew what was going to be asked for, you just go find it!


I did a show in Las Vegas it was at the Rio Casino and it ran for 2 weeks at the end of the first day I ran out of money boy that was a long stay. At first all the traveling and meeting a lot of stars was great however the long highways with days away from home made the job old. My wife would meet me in some cities toward the end of the shows and we would sightsee which was nice.

Funny things did happen, one day the boss called and told me go get the Kenworth tractor and head to Flagstaff right away, a show rig (truck) broke down and they needed the trailer in Phoenix for a show ASAP. Well the Kenworth was an older model and seen its better days however it ran great. Well upon arrival I pulled up to the trailer, hooked up and was on my way to Phoenix, no time to lose. At the auditorium backed it in and ready to drop the trailer. The crew was staring at the rig when one said "where did you get that ugly truck"? I looked at the rig, yes, the tractor I was driving was an old, dirty, faded red, and ugly truck, the show trailer I pulled was painted, designed to promote the show a beautiful mural painted on the trailers sides and once again being pulled by an old faded semi, I got embarrassed. The more I looked at the tractor and trailer it reminded me of "Beauty and the Beast"!

I was hired on as a stage hand at Pope Joy Hall here in Albuquerque which I enjoyed, I even had a small part in a play where I wore a costume and would go onstage to remove a large round ball at the start of the show. I enjoyed working there but everything has its limits.

All the thousands of miles on the road I did not have an accident until I was back in Albuquerque. I was rear ended on I-25 the person who hit me had major damage to his car and it was towed. He also received citations and matching bracelets.

Now that I am fully retired my wife Theresa and I enjoy concerts, going to Wendover NV and taking care of our grandchildren who live here in Albuquerque and in Aztec NM.


