On January 22, 2018 Paul W. Dow started as the 23rd Fire Chief for the Albuquerque Fire Department. He was born and raised in the Albuquerque metro area and started volunteering in the fire service shortly after graduating from Cibola High School. Paul was hired as a full-time firefighter with the Rio Rancho Department of Public Safety (RRDPS) when he was 19 years old and attended the Albuquerque Fire Departments 58th Cadet Class as a representative of RRDPS. Several years later, he returned to AFD and joined the 61st Cadet Class as a member of the Albuquerque Fire Department. Within the first few years at AFD, he and several of his classmates, formed a Firefighter Combat Challenge Team. Together they won several

competitions and competed in the world championships. Over the years, Paul has written several articles published in Fire Engineering magazine and was the editor for the textbook "Fire Service Pump Operator Principles and Practices", Jones and Bartlett Publishers. Since 2007 he has instructed for the Central New Mexico Community College Fire Science program and designed the state's first online IFSAC certification course curriculum. In 2010, he started the department's professional development program, which provides formal education for new company officers. Three times during his career he has been recognized as firefighter of the year by two different fire departments and IAFF Local 244. He has a bachelor's degree in Fire Administration and is currently enrolled in the Organization Leadership/Fire Rescue Executive Leadership graduate program at Waldorf University. During his career Paul was assigned to Engine 5, Engine 3, Squad 2 and the Fire Academy. While he has spent the majority of his career in the southeast heights, his last assignment in the field was as Battalion 1.

Deputy Chief Emily Jaramillo grew up in rural New Mexico. She achieved a BA in English and Secondary Education at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa in 1999. After returning home to New Mexico, Emily taught and coached for four years at Albuquerque Public Schools before joining the Albuquerque Fire Department in 2005. During her time at AFD, Emily has served as an officer in both the Paramedic and Fire Suppression Divisions, represented the department at regional and local STEMI meetings, served on the AFD Safety Committee, taught in the EMS Training Division, and coordinated both the Professional Development and Firefighter Health and Wellness programs. For the last six years, DC Jaramillo has managed the departments Peer Fitness Training Program. She also teaches

fire officer development classes as an adjunct instructor for the New Mexico Firefighter Training Academy and taught Paramedicine in the USAF Pararescue training program for the University of New Mexico. In 2015 she was the recipient of the IAFF 244 Outstanding Leadership Award.

Emily's husband Robert is a Paramedic Firefighter with Bernalillo County Fire Department and they have two young children, Avielle and Isaiah.

<u>Deputy Chief of Planning & Logistics</u> Gilbert Santistevan



Deputy Chief Gil Santistevan is a thirty-year veteran of the Albuquerque Fire Department who joined the AFD in September 1987 as a member of the 44th Fire Cadet class. He has held every rank in the Department and has served in a number of roles. Throughout his career, he has served as a field firefighter (and "third man" on the Rescue); managed the Breathing Air (SCBA) program; worked as the Department Public Information and Public Affairs Officer; and — at different times — has managed the Alarm Room; Technical Services, Fiscal Management, Fleet, Logistics, and Capital programs. He has also been responsible for Strategic Planning, and grants management. As a grant writer, he was

successful in obtaining several million dollars in grant and in-kind funding for the AFD.

Santistevan was also a founding member of FEMA's New Mexico Task Force I Urban Search and Rescue group, with deployments to Oklahoma City – after the 1995 bombing of the Murrah Federal Building; and to the Pentagon after the 9/11 terrorist attacks. He was also involved in some of AFD's largest local and regional deployments: The May 2000 Cerro Grande Fire in Los Alamos, and the fires which burned through the Albuquerque Bosque in June 2003.

Santistevan was the project manager for the 65,000 square foot expansion of the Training Academy, and the construction of new Fire Stations 2 and 7. He was also the project manager for the 2013 ISO project which saw AFD improve to a coveted Class I Public Protection Classification rating. According to ISO Mitigation, of 46,042 fire departments evaluated nationwide, AFD is one of only 241 fire departments recognized by a Class 1 rating - putting AFD squarely in the top 0.5 percent of fire departments nationwide. He believes that the Class 1 rating is a direct reflection and result of the hard work and dedication shown by AFD's personnel. In September 2017, he was appointed to serve as Interim Fire Chief, and he served in that role until the appointment of Fire Chief Paul Dow in January 2018.

Santistevan comes from a firefighter family. Two of his brothers retired from AFD: Lt. Ernest Santistevan and FF Don Santistevan. Another brother, Michael, was a Deputy Chief with Bernalillo County VFD. Nephews Gabriel Healy and David Zamora currently serve with the Department.

Deputy Chief of Operations Sean Elks



Sean Elks was born and raised in Albuquerque, New Mexico. After graduating high school, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps serving four years. Sean joined Albuquerque Fire Rescue in 2000 and has been a member coming up on 18 years. Sean spent all 18 years in the Operations Division while also serving as an instructor for AFR's Professional Development Program that provides training for all Officer Ranks from Lieutenant to Battalion Chief. In May of this year Sean will receive his Bachelor's degree in Fire and Emergency Services Administration from Eastern New Mexico University. Sean was appointed as the Deputy Chief of Operations in February of this year.

Former AFD Paramedic Lt. Frank Maestas

May 8, 2018

On may 8th of this year, A Blue Mass was held in Colorado Springs at St Mary's Cathderal. Dorothy and I attended. The church was packed with Firefighters and Police. Both active and retired. Bishop Michael Sheridan celebrated the mass along with Father Brad Noonan. The Bishop gave the homily and thanked all first re sponders who put themselves in harms way every day. Sometimes giving their own lives in the line of duty. He in turned Thank everyone for doing a profession that very few want to do.

Father Brad Noonan was in charge of the coins that were to be given out to Firefighters and Police after Mass. Bishop Sheridan Blessed the coins during Mass.

The coin, itself, was special ordered by Father Brad and consisted of one side Depicting St Florian imprinted with the words "Servant of God Julia Greeley Pray For Us."

On the other side is "In Loving Memory Of around the edge and four names of Fallen Firefighters in the middle. Father Brad stated that "Julia Greeley was a remarkable woman of faith who loved Firefighter in Denver and had a phenomenal care for the poor

Julia Greeley, African American woman, was born into Slavery in Hannibal Missouri between 1833 and 1848. While still a young child, a cruel slave master, while beating her mother, caught Julia's right eye with the whip that resulted in her loosing the eye.

Freed in 1865, she earned her keep by serving white families in Missouri, Colorado, New Mexico, and Wyoming as a nanny. What little she earned was to sustain her and assist poor families in her neighborhood. She did this mostly under the cover of darkness and in dark alleys, so as to not embarrass the poor.

In1880 she entered the Catholic Church at Sacred Heart Parrish in Denver. The Jesuits, who ran the church, considered her the most devout person they had ever seen. Every month she visited, on foot, every Fire Station in Denver and gave out literature of the Sared Heart League to the firefighters both Catholic and non Catholics alike. She had joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1901 and was an active member until her death in 1918.

As she lived in a boarding house, Julia's body was layed out in the church and Hundreds of people filed past her casket to pay their last respects. People began to ask for her to be considered for canonization, which was finally granted in 2016. Her remains were then moved to Denver's Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception on June 7th of 2017.


She worked as a nanny in many households and was the first nanny to Colorado's first territorial Governor.

When her body was exhumed in 2017, for her being moved to the Cathedral, Her remains were examined and were found to have arthritis in her hands. Feet, and back. Almost every joint in her body probably hurt. This did not stop her from doing God's work by practicing, doing and showing love.

When I met and told Father Brad about our AFD Retiree's Association, I asked him if it was possible to get some extra coins for our leadership officers. He gladly said " it would

be his honor to donate some"!

In a time not too long ago it seems, in 1957, I joined the Albuquerque Fire Department. It is hard to believe that 44 years have passed since that time. There was only eleven fire stations then and a little over 200 people in the department. I do not remember the exact number of firemen. Our training was mostly on the job training at that time. The training lasted only a few weeks. One of the main things was learning how to catch fire hydrants and to lay 2 1/2" fire hose from the tailboard of the pumper. In those days we rode on the back tailboard and hung on with all our might to the chrome bar mounted on the back of the fire truck. There was no such thing as safety belts or an enclosure to keep a fireman from falling off the back of the truck while responding to an alarm or at training sessions. Although safety on the job was stressed during training you pretty much had to look out for yourself regarding personal safety. You had to be alert, have a good grip and pay attention to what you were doing otherwise you could get hurt going to a fire call or catching a fire hydrant. We were called firemen in those days. It wasn't until the early to mid-sixties that the term "Firefighter" was popularized.

Captain Ray Kuhn was the training officer when I came in during 1957. We had a training grounds by the Zoo with a drill tower, but we didn't have a building with class rooms. We didn't have a cadet class as such back then, mostly they referred to us as the new firemen. Only a few people were hired when I joined the department. There were about 8 people hired when I was but I do not remember all their names A few didn't make it through the initial training. Mostly I remember Joe C. Marquez, Chris Rios, and Ernest Gutierrez. Only Joe Marquez and myself made it to retirement. Chris Rios quit early on and Ernie Gitierrez went on to become a District Chief but died of a heart attack at an early age while still in the department.

Art Westerfeld was the Fire Chief when I joined, then he died about 1962. The other Fire Chiefs I served under were Simon Seligman, Ray Kuhn, Arthur Martinez, and Leonard Ortega.

After a few weeks our initial fireman training was completed and we were assigned to Station # 1. I worked on Ladder # 1, Engine 1-A, Engine 1-B, and the Rescue Squad # 1. Then I was transferred to Station #8 and worked out of that station for a while. Mostly I worked around Station # 1 and was finally was assigned to work on the Rescue Squad. I worked with Lt. Myrick and Lt. Cooper. Joe Dauber was the driver on Rescue # 1 on my crew. I liked rescue work and I learned a lot from those guys on my crew.

Our work schedule was 60 hours a week. We worked two weeks day shift (8:00 A.M. to 6:00 PM) and after a 24 hour shift on Sunday we would go to night shift and report in at 6:00 P.M. on Monday. The night shift was also two weeks (6:00 P.M. to 8:00 A.M.) We had two days off per week. Every third month we would get a Kelly day and have three days off in a row.

While working at Station # 1 we used to take food to the guys working next door in the alarm room. I made friends with Nick Saavedra who was a fire alarm operator and he showed me a lot about how things worked in the dispatch center. Many times during his lunch break he would let me answer the phones. After a while I started learning to operate the system and made dispatches for routine calls. I liked working in the alarm room, it was interesting and I thought maybe I would like to work in there. In those days they didn't give promotional exams for that position. When an opening came up they would recommend a person and the Fire Chief would appoint them to alarm operator. It was in the early 1960's that I was appointed to the position of fire alarm operator by Simon Seligman who was the Fire Chief. After my assignment there I liked it and served in that position for over twenty years until my retirement in 1984.

My first supervisor in the Alarm room was Lt. Lucio "Lucky" Valdez. At that time the fire alarm operators served as administrative assistants to the Fire Chief and his Secretary. We maintained the payroll, took care of all sick leave and vacation records and maintained overtime rosters as well as all daily personnel rosters. Also we maintained comprehensive maps for the entire city. My favorite fire department job was serving as fire alarm operator. My main job was maintaining the entire map system for the city and I liked keeping the maps and streets up to date.

My supervisors in the Alarm room over twenty years were: Lt. "Lucky" Valdez, Captain Raymond "Cookie" Chavez, Captain Al Villescas, Captain Robert Cisneros. Also I remember most of the Fire dispatchers I worked with. Some of them had nick names. They were as follows:

In the 1970's the Fire Department hired civilian dispatchers to staff the alarm room who worked side by side by the firefighter dispatchers (Alarm Operators) The ones I worked with for a few years were: John Brown, Rogers, C. Cogburn(Rooster), E. Dennis (Big "D") Rose Fair, Crolett, Richard Wise.

There were many interesting events which occurred over the years as a fire dispatcher, too numerous to mention here. There are a couple of calls that are outstanding in my mind.


Sometime during the 1970's I do not recall the exact date I was working in the alarm room and we started getting calls that the volcanoes on the west mesa were erupting. To me it seemed bizarre and highly unlikely that the volcanoes were erupting. Usually an event of this magnitude would have recevied some warning from the news media or other official warnings. We had not received any such notice or warnings of an impending volcanic eruption. Engine # 14 was dispatched to investigate the situation. Upon investigation the crew reported large columns of black smoke coming from the volcanoes. All the people calling in were indeed seeing black smoke. Finally the firemen of Engine # 14 crew made it to the site and discovered that old car tires and huge piles of trash had been set on fire and was causing huge types of bonfires and emitting large columns of black smoke from the extinct volcanoes. After the fires were extinguished and upon further investigation it was that discovered that students from West Mesa High School were celebrating the end of the school year and decided to have some fun. They had set the trash fires in the extinct volcanoes to have some fun and to have everyone beleive that there was a volcanic eruption. Needless to say there was lots of excitement and concern on the part of citizens calling in. Some people let their imaginations run wild and even reported that the ground was shaking and other strange things as a result of the eruptions. The calls were so numerous during that shift that we were all exhausted and ready to go home when our shift ended. It wasn't too much fun for us in the alarm room but some high school boys had lots of fun with their end of school fling that year.


Another time when I was on duty I received an unusual call which at first sounded like a prank call. There was a strange voice on the line reporting an electrical transformer fire in the Northeast Heights and to send a fire truck right away. Although the call seemed legitimate and the caller was sincere there was something about the voice that I could not comprehend. The voice sounded somewhat electronic and muffeled, yet understandable, something like the people you hear in space movies. Somewhat perplexed and unsure about the caller I did take the call seriously as we were trained to do during unusual situations. I dispatched an engine company to investigate. The call was indeed legitimate. I then learned that the caller had lost his voice box due to cancer and was using an electronic voice device to communicate.


People using these devices were not common at that time and I had never heard of those devices previously. Later we received information and training about victims of this type medical condition. Although not too sure about the legitimacy of the call I'm just glad I did take the caller seriously and sent help. I suppose all the training that we had received about handling emergency calls paid off.

Now it has been over 17 years since I retired having served 27 years in the fire service. Although I do not miss going to work everyday there are times I think about the good times and interesting situations I dealt with on an every day basis as a fire dispatcher. Often I think of the interesting people I met along the way and the many emergency calls I handled. I am glad I was able to help many, many people during their times of need and stressful situations. I am proud to have served as a firefighter and fire alarm dispatcher.



"I remember, my first night on duty and just before bunk time, the seasoned firefighters were telling ghost stories and talking about weird happenings around the station. Later, around three in the morning, I woke up to see my blanket being pulled slowly off of my body, but no one was around. I eventually found out that the prankster used fishing line tied to the blanket to pull it off without being seen. He was a master at it."

John Serino joined AFD in June of 1974 and retired after seventeen years of service. He says that he is truly enjoying his retirement; he is playing in the City's senior division softball league, along with other AFD retirees. He continues to work on his leather craft and, in fact, has become an Arts and Crafts instructor in the Albuquerque Public Schools system.
