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

As we know, Fire Fighting is a hazardous occupation and Fred Teupell is one of AFD's Bravest that can attest to the fact that being a Fire Fighter is very dangerous Early in his career, Fred responded on a Second Alarm Fire Call at "The Sandia Hotel " which was located downtown (SW 1st Street) Fred and another Fire Fighter were trapped under a structural support wall that had collapsed on them requiring Rescue Crews to franticly dig to rescue / extricate these two individuals It was uncertain at the time if Fred was going to lose his leg as a result of the injuries, but with time & physical therapy Fred returned to light duty and eventually full duty Fred Teupell had the support of all AFD Fire Fighters during this ordeal Fred Teupell reminds all of us of the dangers of Fire Fighters

Fred Teupell is a community leader and excellent role model for younger Fire Fighters to emulate Fred Teupell has always been a modest man who also is a decorated Viet Nam Veteran The AFD Retirees are proud to call him "Brother" For the above reasons, Fred is deserving of this special recognition award

The Felix Garza Story

Editors Note; Felix is a retired San Antonio, Texas Firefighter who has been a resident in Albuquerque and became an honorary member of the Albuquerque Fire Department Retirees Association. His SAFD Service Career 1964-1997

Felix started at the San Antonio Training Division with a class of approximately 12 other firefighter cadets. Training lasted six months which actually seemed like a whole year Felix said with a grin. Training consisted of fire hose evolutions, ladder practices, ropes, breathing apparatus (BA), search and rescue, along with other subject matter.

I remember in training Felix said we did the "Church Raise" with ropes secured to the tip of the top of the ladder and down the other side. That was a tough drill as well as duplicating the drill again except with the aerial ladder, we would climb up to the top and down the backside. I am not sure if they were checking our nerves or covering different things that you could face or maybe just to check your confidence level. We would jump into the Life Net over and over and it got to be more tiring to go up the drill tower stairs then jumping into the net.

In the mid-1960's, use of BA's was taught during training because they were carried on the ladder trucks in the field. Later on, I believe the pumpers carried two (2) BA's that were stored on top of the truck but were rarely used Felix said.

In the field the old "smoke eaters" would look at you funny if you put on a BA and would say, "what's the matter – can't take the smoke?" As a matter of fact, gloves were optional and you'd fight fires with just your helmet and bunker coat. So after a fire, the firefighters would come out of a building coughing, spitting, blood shot eyes and blowing the snot out from their nose and then light up a cigarette for rest and recovery (R&R). In the 70's great changes started to happen with mandatory use of personal protective equipment (PPE) at emergencies.

Looking back Felix said as a firefighter I remember a rescue call where a man was trimming a large tree when one of the limbs approximately 8-10 inches in diameter snapped crushing his foot and he was unable to free himself. He was up the tree about 25 feet. Upon our arrival, the whole neighborhood showed up and they were screaming for us to do something. We laddered the tree and were able to free him...however, the story didn't end there. Down below, two old men (about our age now) were yelling at each other and then they started to fight. An old lady about 81 years old came out of the house yelling at the men and then started beating both of them with a broom to stop fighting. That didn't stop the fighting so the old lady grabbed the garden hose and started hosing them down and that finally stopped the fight.

This is one of those situations where there was a rescue in progress and a sideshow at the same time. After leaving the scene, we could not stop laughing...what a comedy!

Another rescue I remembered responding to was a fully engulfed house fire. Upon arrival things were happening really fast. A distraught mother screamed that a child was in the house. A pre-connect was pulled and an off duty firefighter actual started knocking down the fire as we entered the back of the house. We went through heavy, dark, hot smoke and at first we couldn't find the child. We stood silent and that's when we heard the faint breathing and coughing. By the time we found the 14-month old child behind an old claw foot tub his body was lifeless and I immediately started CPR and brought him back. The cause of the fire was a space heater, the things people do Felix said!

Eddie said, Felix you talk about this rescue with a lot of feeling why? I talk about this rescue because in our firefighting careers we have all experienced different outcomes so it's nice to remember the good ones Felix said.

My association with the Albuquerque Fire Department's Retiree Association (AFDRA) started when my wife and I stopped at a garage sale. She noticed a FF's license plate on a parked truck. I asked about the plate and the person turned out to be Joe Martinez and one thing led to another. Joe invited me to attend a meeting and the warm reception from "brother firefighters" was great and now I am an Honorary AFDRA member. That's been over 4 years ago and it's been a great fellowship for us as we've enjoyed the picnics and Christmas parties.

One of the first meetings I attended at the union hall everyone and everything was still new to me. I found out just like church retirees had their own place to sit. One side of the room against the wall was some nice comfortable high back swivel chairs so I said to myself think I will sit here. Well being comfortable looking around this tall mature looking man said; "you are in my chair"! I stood up and apologized to him for sitting in his chair, he immediately said in a serious voice, this row of chairs is called "DEATH ROW" for us old guys with short time left! However with his immediate warm smile and the look in his eyes it happened, I knew I was in the right place with my brother firefighters, thanks Juan Sandoval. In my time with AFDRA what Juan said may have some merit because some of the retirees who sat in the Death Row Seats have left us, this is something only firefighters can say to one another.

Felix said with a smile one thing I can say is, what you guys did (Albuquerque Retirees) to put together an association like this one is so wonderful and great. I hope other retired firefighters across the nation have something like the Albuquerque Fire Department Retirees Association.

We moved to Albuquerque over 14 years ago and were involved in the choirs at St Anne's and San Felipe de Neri Church. My wife was the choir director and led adult and children's choir. With my wife's musical training, I learned to be a cantor and that can be tough because you are now alone in front of the congregation (more stressful than some working fires I encountered).

I'm proud to say that my son-in-law is also a Lt. and is aspiring to be promoted to Captain. His son (my grandson) is also a firefighter. So we can truly be called a "firefighter family." We are moving back to Texas and have set our sights on living at the coast because I want to relax and do a lot of fishing in the gulf. Also, my wife's doctor suggested that she needed a more humid climate. We have two daughters living in the San Antonio and our son who just retired from the Navy and lives in California. With our seven grandkids and two great-grandkids in Texas, we'll be able to see them more often. Although the kids loved coming here to Albuquerque during Balloon Fiesta and for skiing, now they'll have to visit us and learn to fish instead.

I will miss the fellowship of the AFDRA and sharing our mutual experiences. I thank you all for welcoming us into the Albuquerque firefighter family.....Felix Garza.

Drills Like This Had Impact On The Old Gluteusmaximus

The David Junick Story

Dave started his career with Albuquerque Fire Department (AFD) July 1978 retired July 1998 perfect 20 year career.

Dave said my interest for the fire service began when I met firefighter Paul Mares, his mother lived 3 houses away from ours so I would talk with Paul now and then. After listing to some of Paul's stories it got my excitement level going and I was determined to be a firefighter especially with AFD.

When I started fire training, Louie Trujillo was Training Academy Chief; there were 5 instructors for our class of 13. The instructors were JP Kendrick, Frank

Chavez, Bernie Rutan, Solomon Jojola and Pete Mirabal.

Ladder drills were something else especially when the instructors said Church Raise with the 50' Bangor Dave, said because it never failed the wind would blow. You would climb to the top rung of the ladder, call out your name and climb over the top and climb back down to the ground. Another drill conducted Dave said was, Solomon would have us jump into the life net over and over again until he felt we did it right, yeah what was right? *Drills like this had impact on the old gluteusmaximus* One big plus was our entire class made it from start to finish we all graduated together.

Dave said my first field assignment was ladder 3 platoon "A"; my first officer was Dave Villanueva and the drivers were Kenny Alvis and Jerry Valencia. The pipeman would float to the rescue and pumper from the ladder, the pumper had to have a five man crew at all times.

I actually offered to be assigned to the rescue because I liked the medical aspect of the calls I thought were exciting. I also worked for Superior Ambulance part time for 20 years. Back in the early days Superior would transport deceased persons from their homes or hospitals to a mortuary as well as other patient transport activities. It never bothered me because it's all part of the job you are doing.

Joe Escobedo (Scooby) and I worked part time together at Superior Ambulance and our friendship continued to the end. The staff started calling us the "Odd Couple" because of our kidding and yelling at each other, *you know how fireman are!* As with any fireman Scooby liked to eat so I did volunteer to cook in the station, because as tradition the cook did not have to wash dishes but I did wash anyway. My dishes were; meat loaf, pork chops and enchiladas' three days three meals.


From station three I was transferred to station 15 which was ok, I also worked at stations 11, 8 and 9 Dave said. While assigned to station nine (9) Ralph Ortega was our officer and I guess he had an understanding with Eddie Abeita who was a training officer at the fire academy. Engine nine (9) would be scheduled first for in service training which would involve a drill. Lieutenant Ortega said I want our engine to go first so we do not hear from others what the drill is about. The scenario is just like going to a fire unknown factors. Another officer on the opposite shift also felt the same way but the 3rd one would say he (Eddie) is just picking on us to go first. I guess we worked well because Eddie would tell us, "with your crew doing the drill first" we can make adjustments to the drill if needed.

Station life was always interesting I worked approximately 15 years with Joe Martinez (aka Blue Eyes) at different stations we just could not break away from one another. When Joe and were at station 8 we had the Ford pumper standard shift the pipemen would ride the tailboard. The trend in the 80's was to retire the tailboard so we received another pumper with jump seats for us to be belted in and boy it was a hand me down a 1973 American La France pumper it was old but it ran and pumped.


Firefighters would ask me about my nickname, I was called "OJO" (eye) that was given by James Gallegos. He would kid everyone just his sense of humor. One firefighter would call me "JuneNeck" because I would rub and scrub them pans real hard. On the pumper we had a perfectly sized pike pole which I claimed as mine...so when working with James Parker he would tell other firefighters, at any fire be careful not to use David's pike pole because it belongs to him! Yeah I said it's mine!

Upon retirement I worked full time at Sandia Casino with other firefighters Dave said, the shift I worked was the grave yard. You would deal with people that had been partying for hours and so you encountered rowdy people. I took up golf many years ago but kind of let it go however started playing again with Gabe Serna but that became limited.

I do not have much personal time due to my wife's illness and her accidents these past years Dave said. It seems when she starts doing well something else goes wrong, Kind of like we take one step forward and then two steps back. But we are fighters so we will overcome, even if it is a slow process so most of my time is dedicated to her.....



Death, Emilio Carriaga - We regret to announce the death of our retired brother firefighter Emilio Carriaga, age 80, who passed away on Saturday February 14, 2015 after a long term illness. He joined AFD in January 1956. He was a driver and retired during July, 1983 after serving 27 years with the department. Early in his career he was drafted into the U.S. Army where he served two years at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indiana. After his military service he returned to work as a fireman and served most of his career in District #1 and worked at all the West side fire stations. He was promoted to driver in May, 1968. There were a little over 150 firemen in the department at that time and beginning pay for firefighters was around \$ 285.00 per month. We will miss Emilio and his great smile. He was a part of our special band of firefighters who formed strong bonds even into retirement. On behalf of the AFD retirees, sincere condolences go to the entire Carriaga family.

BILL RAUPFER (MARCH 14, 2001)

The following account is a short summary of my Fire Department career. When I joined the Albuquerque Fire Department in March 1969, Ray Kuhn was the Fire Chief. My class consisted of eleven cadets. One flunked out and ten graduated. Out of that ten seven went on to retire. They are Al Armenta, Joe Tapia, Allen Rhodes, Danny Perea, George Torres, Andy Romero and myself.

Our training officers were two newly promoted men, Assistant Chief Esequiel "Skippy" Padilla, and Captain Alfonso "Al" Lujan.

In 1969 we went through six weeks of training mostly hose lays and with a small class it seemed never ending. Lay hose, pick up hose, lay hose, pick up hose, lay hose, pick up hose and so on.

Our training officers set aside one day for rappelling. Chief Padilla was going to show us how to rappell down a building, "freefall". With the assisatance of Captain Lujan, who we later found out was not familiar with the duties during this manauver, the Chief went up to the 7th floor of the drill tower and proceeded to wrap the life line three times around the hook on his safety belt. Now, with his weight of maybe 100 lbs, this was clearly too many times. As you can guess, he went about six feet and stopped, no hands, and swung back into the open window of the 6th floor. He stuck his head out the window and shouted down to us all on the ground. "Now I will show you how to get all the way down."

As I recall, Captain Lujan was as impressed as we were. After some adjustments to the lifeline, Chief Padilla again appeared in the window facing out and said "Ready" to which Captain Lujan replied, "Yes". Again, Captain Lujan was unfamiliar with this training procedure, but we cadets were totally unaware of that fact

So, out jumps Chief Padilla and immediately began to wave his hands and yell something about the rope. "Rope, Rope, Rope!" As Chief Padilla was passing the 4th floor Captain Lujan reached over and grabbed the life line that Chief Padilla was coming down and took up just enough slack to bring the Chief to a gentlestop on the ground, feet first.

Well, let me tell you, all eleven of us cadets were so impressed that we could see ourselves in this same situation at a fire. With flames licking at our heels and children in hand we could leap from the window and pray that the Captain would have all his training by then. Now I look back on my career and remember all of the good times and a few rough times. Yes, I miss the department. There will never will be another job to compare with it. But I am older now, and I can finally sit back, relax, and say, "You gotta be crazy to run into a burning building."

Bill Raupfer-Currently Bill Raupfer is serving as Vice President of The AFD Retiree's Association and he is one of the original organizers Of the Association. He also heads our prestigious Honor Guard. Born in Fort Wayne, Indiana he eventually adopted Albuquerque as his home. He joined AFD in March, 1969 and was promoted to driver in May 1980. After serving the Department for 21 years he retired in November, 1990. Bill and his wife Marilynn are now living in Edgewood, New Mexico.




