

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


KERRY HORTON (6-13, 2014)

HOOK & LADDER COMPANIES

The Albuquerque Volunteer Fire Department was organized in February, 1882 shortly after the coming of the railroad in 1880. It was named "Albuquerque Fire Company," a hook & ladder company. Later in July, 1882 it was re-named "Albuquerque Hook & Ladder Company." There were 25 volunteer firemen assigned to the fire company. Also common in those days were lantern boys (12-15 years old) who ran ahead of the ladder wagons to light the way for the firemen at night.

Hand drawn ladder wagons aren't older than horse drawn fire apparatus. Small towns did not require large horse drawn firefighting equipment and did not want the expense of maintaining horses. Although horse drawn fire equipment was the mainstay of larger departments in that era, many communities bought apparatus that were pulled to the fire by the firemen. The fire wagons carried pike poles (hooks) ladders, leather buckets, fire hose, axes, pry bars, tools and other small firefighting appliances. The ladder wagons carried ground ladders and a roof ladder. The roof ladders had hooks that were spring loaded so they could grasp on the peak of a roof and lay flat for climbing. It was used to provide better footing and safety during wet or inclement weather conditions.

The ladder wagons carried axes, picks and the famed "hook," giving it the name "Hook & Ladder." The hook was used to pull down damaged buildings or chimneys to stop the spread of fire by creating a fire break. Sometimes in chimneys a fire would get going and could not be easily put out. The hook was used to pull the chimneys down with a chain and rope. Long sticks were used to get the hook up to the height to whatever they needed to grab or whatever piece of the building they needed to latch onto. They would use the chain and the rope hooked to the building and a bunch of men would grab that to pull the wall down, or pull the chimney down.

The firemen had axes, pry bars, picks, tools for doing overhaul and for busting into buildings. It is called forcible entry today. The axes are used once on the roof to cut a hole to affect the vertical ventilation, which allows all the unburned products of combustion, the superheated gases and smoke, out of the building or house. This makes it much easier for the firefighters coming from the ground level to extend their hose lines, and conduct their search, to be able to see, and to be in a much better climate that will not be as hot.

The ladder wagons of old did not have a mechanically assisted ladder. It just carried what we call ground ladders that are erected by manpower. Usually they carried a 40 or 50 Bangor ladder as well. They also carried leather fire buckets on the side of the apparatus. They allowed the use of fire bucket brigades once at the fire scene.

Pike poles were carried on top of the wagon and were used to pull down ceilings to get to the seat of the fire and were used to punch holes in walls and ceilings, also used to pull down eves of buildings. As early chimneys were not all brick many were made of mud, straw or grass and would burn easily. Many were of sub standard construction. Fire would find it's way into nooks and cranny's. Firemen would pull the walls or chimneys down to get to the fire and put it out.

In September 1881 Albuquerque formed the Fergusson Hook & Ladder Company which was named after a prominent citizen and Lawyer Harvey Fergusson who was an avid supporter of the fire department. The company consisted of 25 volunteer firemen. The firemen used ropes attached to the side of the fire wagon to pull the apparatus to the fire.

Frank Maestas Story By Eddie Abeita

"Loss of life calls- many firefighters have experienced them, they just don't talk about them..... these calls never leave you!

Prior to Frank's career with AFD he was in the construction industry located in Colorado. Frank relocated to work bridge construction in New Mexico where he worked as foreman throughout the state.

Frank continued his work in New

Mexico and decided to seek permanent residence in the state and wanted a change in career. Frank read in the newspaper the city was hiring for both fire and police positions. Frank felt one or the other would be fine however after an interview with Chief Arthur Martinez he made his mind up the fire department would be his call, thus his career started.

He started his fire training March 7, 1966 with training officers Skippy Padilla and Al Lujan. Franks fellow classmates/recruits he remembers were Rick Winters, Tom Lopez, Efren Garcia, Anthony Vigil, Art Loera and Eppie Ortega. I remember one rope drill Frank said it was rappelling down the drill tower with manila rope as the lifeline. I went out the window, came down so fast that I bounced on the safety net like hitting a trampoline.

Upon graduation from fire training Frank was assigned to ladder one under the watchful eye of Lieutenant Israel Morales. Fire Station one had the old brass poles which could be intimidating to a rookie but I was taught how to slide down correctly Frank said. Captain Herman Bishop would hold class daily if you wanted to learn and prepare for promotional examinations that was the place to be Herman was so knowledgeable and a good teacher.

Frank was asked about cooking; I really never cooked at the station but I did make coffee, Tom Lopez said the trick is to make bad coffee so you will never be asked to make it again. In the early days I worked with Horace Vigil who made the best green chile stew I have ever tasted. He would always draw attention especially when he made fresh tortillas or sopapillas with the meal. There were always activities at the station Frank said, Rudy Sanchez taught me how to play chest and Hank Delgado taught me how to play ping pong (chased the ball a lot. I played softball with these guys they were great!

Frank said, my first major fire was a warehouse in the north valley that had a basement the size of the building. We were dispatched from station one and upon arrival the building was fully involved. We were put on a hose line (2 ½") and were given orders to advance the hose line down in the basement area......... Hank Delgado was backing me up on the 2 ½", Hank yelled its getting hot look at the ceiling without warning a flashover occurred. I remember stumbling trying to get up and out, when Hank's strong arms yanked me out of that inferno. Today I still credit Hank for saving my life.

Back then it was like a bonus to be called upon to work an E.T. (extra time). One particular ET I worked we had a fire call on Broadway SE; it was bad from start to finish. When we pulled up in front of the house it was fully engulfed in fire we heard screams, everyone worked so frantic to save the occupants, however the family all perished the mother and five children. Loss of life calls- many firefighters have experienced them, they just don't talk about them, these calls never leave you!

I asked if I could ride on the rescue Frank said, the officer was Al Villascas. One of the first calls we were dispatched to was a 7 year old girl that was shot by the baby sister. It was accidental we worked on her at the location where I even gave mouth to mouth resuscitation. It was a sad situation the little girl did not survive.

Humor can happen at the craziest time(s). While on the rescue we had spared out to the only available unit, a van which normally carried the hi-ex foam generator. The generator came out and our rescue equipment went in we secured the equipment as best as we could with being no compartments. One particular in the van Tom Placencia was driving to a location downtown. Tom took the one way heading west when a young driver ran a stop sign which we T-boned. Equipment went flying all over the place beating me up. When we came to rest I was bleeding my boot had a cut through it my uniform was torn Lieutenant Aranda called for help. A local media crew who was monitoring the radio transmissions driving a station wagon pulled up next to us, Ross immediately told them we need to get this firefighter to Presbyterian emergency room right now... which they were glad to help. While in the ER Fire Chief Kuhn showed-up to check on our condition, with all the excitement Ross broke out laughing looking at me and said out loud "look your shorts are torn"! I was released to go home with a slight concussion.

In our early days as paramedics I remember being dispatched to a person having a heart attack at a medical conference. Upon arrival we ran through all advanced life support procedures including the use of the paddles (defibrillation). We were able to bring him back..... A save. Doctors in attendance were so amazed with our procedures because a lot of them at the time were just getting to know about fire department's paramedic programs in general, so that call was a good memory!

Every now and then I think of our old softball games with EPFD (EI Paso Fire Department) that was better than any sporting event you could be part of. This softball game was named and dedicated to EPFF GUZMAN who was killed. Guzman was an innocent bystander when the tragic incident took place. Spending time with EP Firefighters was the best part, although different cities firefighters are firefighters and it's a "brotherhood". In his early days while in AFD Frank also coached Golden Gloves amateur boxing where he had a working relation training with Albuquerque pro-boxer Joey Limas. Frank coached two Regional Golden Glove fighters.

Frank and his wife Dorothy live in Colorado where they await the visit of their kids and grandkids. Living in a rural area in the mountains, you are only minutes from fishing, hunting, skiing and any other mountain sport.

The Society of American Foresters recently had their annual meeting in Albuquerque, and I was the General Chairman of this meeting. We had in excess of 1,700 persons registered, representing ten countries. During the course of our arrangements, we had anticipated the need for certain emergency services, and set up a procedure for the use of the 911 emergency call, should it be needed. All of the sessions were to be conducted at the Hilton Inn, Albuquerque, except for a luncheon and general session which were conducted at the Convention Center on Wednesday, October 5th.

On Tuesday, October 4th, during one of the general sessions that was being conducted in the forenoon, Dr. Stephen Spurr was stricken with what appeared to be a cardiac involvement at the conclusion of his speech. I happened to be present at the time, and called our Communications Center and requested that they call 911 and also notify the Hilton Inn Hotel. All I know is that within a very, very short period of time, your Rescue No. 2 Squad appeared. While I did Not know their names at the time, I have since learned that they were Lt. Frank T Maestas, Officer in Charge, accompanied by Mr. Landjur Abukusumo and Mr. Omar Diningrad. All of those present were greatly impressed no only by the speed with which they responded to the call, but also the very professional manner in which they conducted themselves in providing the necessary first aid and tests for Dr. Spurr prior to his being taken to the Presbyterian Hospital Emergency Room.

All of us have been aware of the Rescue Squad Paramedic Service. However, this is the first opportunity that I have had to view them in action. I do feel compelled to compliment them on the manner in which they reacted, and the unmistakable professional competency with which they conducted themselves. It would be greatly appreciated if you would convey my sincere thanks to them for this service.

I am further pleased to report that Dr. Spurr spent two days in the Presbyterian Hospital undergoing a series of tests and observations, and was able to return to his home in Austin, Texas, on Thursday afternoon. He has asked me to convey his personal thanks to the men who responded so readily to his need for help.

You should indeed be proud to have men like this in your service.

Art Westerfeld was the Chief and "Mac" worked with Assistant Chiefs, Simon Seligman, Milton Grande, Leo Renaud, S.B. Skidmore, Joe Bowdich, and Carl Macaluso. Then firemen worked 72 hours per week. Maclovio was promoted to driver in May, 1957 and served in that position for 20 years. He was a reserved and easy going man and was well liked by his fellow firefighters. "Mac" Was part of that special breed of firefighters from the old school who helped build the department From almost nothing during the 50's, 60"s, and 70'S to what it is today. He was a member of The AFD Retiree's Association during the past 14 years and faithfully attended the retiree Annual picnics.



Fireman who loved his job. However he had a reputation for telling tall tales. He had a knack for stretching a story and we never knew when it was for real or that Raymond was having fun at our expense. About his stories we always said, "Believe It Or Not." Needless to say, his stories were always interesting. Raymond will be remembered as a fun guy and we will miss him. Our most sincere condolences to the entire Carillo Family.

PHILLIP B. SMITH DIES- Our friend and brother firefigher, retired Lieutenant Phillip B. Smith, age 83, passed away on Saturday July 19, 2014. He spent most of his career working At fire stations on the west side of town mainly at Station # 1 as an engine officer. He was a sincere and dedicated firefighter and was looked up to by the younger men As their leader. He was part of the senior Lieutenants that were the backbone of the Department who helped build the department from 200 people to over 500 people From the 1950's to the 1980's. He joins the ranks of numerous department officers Who in their 80's have now passed the torch on to the younger men. We are all


