ALBUQUERQUE FIRE DEPARTMENT, 1924 FROM SANBORN MAP COMPANY

The Fire Department has a fully paid two platoon system. Personnel include a fully paid Fire Chief, one paid Assistant Chief and 19 fully paid firemen. There are two Fire stations, Central Fire Station located at City Hall on West Tijeras Avenue & North 2 nd Street. There is one Chief and 12 firemen at this station. The Chief's auto is Owned by the Chief and rented by the City. One American La France triple combination, 750 gallon pumper, a chemical 40 gallon and hose auto truck with 1200 feet of 2 1/2 hose in Good condition is housed here along with one 75 foot American La France aerial auto truck. There is a reserve 750 gallon triple combination pumper with 1200 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose, With a 40 gallon chemical tank here in good condition.

this story for our newsletter. Fire Station # 2 is located at 214 South Edith Street. There is One Assistant Chief and 7 firemen stationed here. One American La France triple combination 750 gallon pumper, 40 gallon chemical and hose auto truck with 1200 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose in good condition. The department is fully motorized. The Gamwell fire alarm system has 41 boxes which includes 12 fire boxes of A.T. & S. F. R. R. Companies box system. Their general alarm is by whistle at the pump house.

Fire alarm headquarters is located at City Hall and Central Fire Station which is of fire proof Construction. The A. T. & S. F. R. R Company maintains a fully paid Fire department consisting of one fully paid Fire Chief and 3 fully paid firemen. There are also 7 volunteer, part paid, firemen here. The railroad fire station is located on the railroad grounds near South First Street & Atlantic. This station has one American La France combination 40 gallon chemical auto truck with 1200 feet of 2 1/2 inch fire hose in excellent condition. There is a reciprocal arrangement between the railroad fire department and the City fire department for responding to calls in the event of serious conflagration.

AFD RETIREE HORACIO QUINTANA PASSES AWAY

It is with regret that we report that On March 4, 2011 AFD retiree Horacio Quintana passed away after a brief illness. Horace joined AFD in August 1957 when there were 11 Fire Stations and about 200 firefighters. 8 people were hired along with Horace. Training was on the job. There was no Fire Academy and the department used 2 ½ Inch hose. That year Fire Chief Art Westerfeld formed the Fire Training School, Fire Prevention Bureau, and established the first rescue squad. He worked mostly out of Station # 1 And served on the pumpers, Ladders and Rescue Squad. In those days firemen worked 60 hours a week, 2 weeks day shifts and then 2 weeks night shifts. They had two days off each week.

He was promoted to fire alarm operator by Fire Chief Simon Seligman in the early 1960's. The Alarm Room Supervisor was Lucio "Lucky" Valdez. At that time there were no civilian staff Personnel. Just the Fire Chief's Secretary. In addition to serving as fire dispatchers The Alarm operators served as administrative Assistants to the Fire Chief. They maintained the payroll, sick leave and vacation records, Overtime rosters, City maps, fire hydrant maps. The main speciality of Horace was to update and maintain the City Maps. He served under three fire alarm Superintendants, "Lucky Valdez, Raymond "Cookie" Chavez, and Al Villescas.



Horacio was known for giving his fellow workers nick names. Examples: Nick Saavedra (Hands) Joe Dauber (Preacher), Virgil Harcrow (Scarecrow) Anastacio Padilla (Gomer), Herman Jaramillo (Teardrops) Dale Noblett (Pinky), and Sebastain Mirabal (Sammy Davis Jr.)

Horace remembered sometime during the early 1970's that calls flooded the alarm room reporting that the volcanoes were erupting on the West mesa. Although skeptical he dispatched Engine # 14 to investigate. Sure enough columns of black smoke was coming from the volcanoes. Upon investigation it was determined that huge piles of old car tires had been set on fire by pranksters and were emitting large columns of black smoke. Engine # 14 extinguished the fire and went home.

One day while on duty Horace received a strange call. The voice of the caller seemed non-human. It sounded like a muffled electronic voice, something from an outer space movie. The caller sounded sincere yet muffled. The person was reporting an electrical transformer fire in the Northeast heights. Although apprehensive Horace dispatched a pumper to investigate. Sure enough there was a transformer on fire. The call was legitimate. The caller had lost his voice box due to cancer and was using an electronic voice device to communicate.

Horace was always proud to be a firefighter, but more importantly, he was proud to have had the priviledge to serve as a fire alarm operator. Many times he thought of the many interesting people he met and the thousands of citizens he helped.

After serving 27 years with the fire department Horacio Quintana retired during April 1984. His great love was spending time with his family, especially his grand children. When the AFD Retiree's association was formed in June, 2000 Horace was one of the first members. He served as a good and faithful member of the Retiree' Association for over ten years.

Note: Horacio's son Chris Quintana is an active duty firefighter with AFD.

ALBUQUERQUE HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEMBERS VISIT THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

On Sunday afternoon April 10 th, 2011 members of the Albuquerque Historical Society attended a program at the Albuquerque Fire Academy on the history of the Fire Department dating back to 1882. The group was led by Janet Saiers, President of the historical society. Their group is working diligently to preserve Albuquerque's history and to get members of the community interested and involved.


The program was opened by President Sam Trujillo who welcomed everyone and gave an overview of the AFD Retiree's Association. He introduced Janet Saiers President of the Historical Society. Janet thanked all who attended and gave an overview of the purpose of the Historical Society. Historian Herman Bishop gave a talk on the history of AFD dating from 1882 when the Fire Department was formed as a volunteer fire brigade to present date. He also gave a tour of the photos displayed in the auditorium and in the museum dating from the turn of the century (1900) and explained who the people and events depicted in the pictures were.

John Serino gave a talk on the memorial plaque displayed in the lobby in honor of our retired firefighters. Ralph Sedillo took the group into the museum and explained how he had restored the two antique fire trucks, a 1920, 75 foot American La France aerial ladder truck (Albuquerque's first aerial) and a 1927 American La France fire truck which was purchased after Pumper # 2 was totaled out after a wreck.

Sam Trujillo pointed out the retiree brass tags honor roll boards displayed in the museum. Tom Romero gave a tour and explained the tradition of the special displays presented by each cadet class to the department after their graduation. The plaques are displayed throughout the building and list names of instructors, cadet names, the date of graduation and number of the cadet class.

The following retirees assisted in welcoming guests and answering questions posed by the group. They were: Noel Baca, Marx Deer, Bill Raupfer and Fred Casias.

At the conclusion Janet Saiers thanked the AFD Retiree's for the afternoon's informative and interesting program. She stated, "This piece of Albuquerque's history adds to the overall of picture of our past and adds to the rich and colorful story which makes Albuquerque great!"

Bill Raupfer head of the retiree honor guard presented Ray Flores an official retiree jacket for his faithful participation on the honor guard by serving as our official trumpeter.





1920 AMERICAN LA FRANCE 75' AERIAL LADDER TRUCK

On April 19, 1915 Fire Chief Jacob Klein submitted his annual report to the City Council and he recommended that the City purchase a 75' motor driven aerial ladder truck.

Fred Russell was Fire Chief and John T. Mclaughlin was mayor when the City Commission approved \$20,000 for the purchase of a 75' motor driven aerial ladder truck. It was manufactured in Elmira, New York by the American La France factory. The new ladder truck arrived by train in Albuquerque on December 31, 1920.

The truck was a tillered vehicle and had a steering wheel in the front and steering wheel in the back. The wheel base was 29 feet, two inches. The wheels were cast iron steel in the front and the back wheels were artillery type. It was powered by a 105 horse power 6 cylinder engine. The engine was aluminum and cast iron with three separate heads, two cylinders per head. The bore was 5 ½ inches and the stroke was 5 inches. Other equipment included 4-kerosene lanterns, 4-rubber fire buckets, and a siren that was hand cranked by a fireman.

The first fire call occurred on January 24, 1921 to the Economist store at 308 West Central Avenue. There was a small electrical fire and the firemen quickly extinguished it.

The truck was known as Ladder #1 and was stationed at the downtown station #1 located at 2 nd Street and Tijeras N.W. After 23 years service it was retired in 1945. In the late 1940's it was donated to the City of Morarity, N. M. In the late 1950's it was acquired by the Longhorn Ranch, a roadside attraction directly east of Morarity, adjacent to Interstate - 40.

A gentleman who regularly drove between Albuquerque and Amarillo was fascinated by the old fire truck slowly deteriorating outside in the sun with no cover. Mr. Ross Speer was a security administrator for the old Atomic Energy Commission. First he worked for Sandia Labs and then for Pantex nuclear weapons assembly plant in Amarillo, Texas.

Mr. Speer bought the truck got it running and had lots of fun driving it about town, visiting neighbors and showing it off. After Mr. Speer died in 1977 his widow, Roberta Speer, offered the vehicle for sale to the City of Albuquerque. Mayor Ken Schultz and Fire Chief Gerald Grimm agreed on a price of \$7,500 and purchased the truck from Mrs. Speers.


Firefighter Ralph Sedillo was given the job along with firefighter Pablo Garcia Jr. and Frank Apodaca, fire department maintenance, to restore the old rig. The City provided the men the time and money to complete the job.

Working from American La France catalogs Sedillo and his crew used the City Maintenance yards off 4 th Street to turn the vintage truck into a restored masterpiece. They had to fabricate new fenders, a steering wheel, new ladders, reworked the motor, found new solid rubber tires, and gave the entire truck a snappy new red paint job.

Ralph said, "there was no Pep Boys store or local parts store to find parts for this antique truck." The restoration crew led by Ralph Sedillo had to be creative and inventive to put it all together. Today the antique ladder truck is displayed at the Albuquerque Fire Department Museum, located at the West side Fire Academy, 11500 Sunset Gardens S. W.

Recently Ralph had the opportunity to give a lecture about restoring the antique truck to the Albuquerque Historical Society during their Fire Department visit to learn about the History of the Fire Department. Ralph was instrumental in forming the AFD Retiree's Association and presently serves an the Association's Advisory Board.

1927 AMERICAN LA FRANCE PUMPER (May 15, 2011)

The Fire Department bought this pumper truck in 1927 as a replacement for old Engine # 2 which had been totaled out in a wreck earlier in the year. It arrived on July 12, 1927. Clyde Tingley was Mayor and Fred Russell was the Fire Chief.

On May 24, 1927 Fire Chief Russell and his driver Simon Seligman were responding to a fire call when the Fire Chief's car collided with pumper # 2 causing them to collide with a City street car. It turned out to be a false alarm.

Chief Russell and fireman Seligman were both almost killed in the wreck. They were rushed to the hospital emergency room. Chief Russell had his ear torn off, had his ribs busted and a broken arm. The Doctors were able to sew Chief Russell's ear back on.

Simon Seligman had a broken leg and his ribs were busted. Both men were in critical condition but survived. Russell served four more years as Chief once he recovered. Seligman became Fire Chief in 1962 and spent 41 years with the department.

This pumper saw 30 years service on the line, about 25 years as an active pumper and then about 5 years as a reserve pumper. It was taken out of service about 1957 and retired. The truck has been refurbished twice, once when Albuquerque had white fire trucks. Later, in 1977 it was refurbished again by Firefighter Ralph Sedillo. For 40 years we used the truck in parades and fire prevention displays. Some times we used it to pump out the duck and seal ponds at the Zoo and to pump out the City swimming pool by the Zoo.

During the 1980's because the truck had frequent break-downs and repairs were expensive we built a trailer and hauled it to displays and parades rather than driving it. Two years ago when the new Fire Academy was built the truck was placed in the Fire Museum along with the 1920 ladder truck and is now on permanent display.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION - (Information provided by Fire Chief Ray Kuhn, April 28, 1972).

Taken out of service, 1957. 1927 built in Elmira, New York by the American La France Company. Cost, \$20, 000. Horsepower-115, piston size- 4 ½ inch bore, 5 ½ inch stroke, Updraft Carburetor-gravity flow, Engine- Aluminum & Cast Iron, 3-separate heads-two pistons per head

Priming cups were used on the heads in 1927 and later because the batteries were not powerful enough to turn the engine over. Sometimes gasoline was put into the priming cups and the engine had to be hand cranked to get it started.

The radiator is made by Rolls Royce, and is the only thing on the truck foreign made. The pump is a rotary gear and was originally rated at 750 GPM. The last test many years ago it only pumped 550 GPM at 120 psi.


The gasoline tank is 40 gallons capacity and the steering is the cam and lever type. The "K" valve located on the right side of the pump is operated as a relief valve. The large chrome valve on the front side of the pump is a relief valve. It is used to allow water to by-pass from discharge to intake side of pump if "K" valve were to fail.
