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

Death Mariano Padilla — Regretfully we announce the death of our brother and fellow retired firefighter Mariano Padilla, age 96, who passed away on April 4, 2022. He joined AFD on March 30, 1956 and after spending 25 years of faithful and dedicated service to the department and his community, he retired on July 1, 1981. He was promoted to driver on April 18, 1960 and spent most of his career driving the apparatus at Station one, Engine One, Ladder One and Rescue One. He was part of a family of firefighters. His Brothers Marvin and Victor Padilla joined their brother and made firefighting their career as well. We referred to them as the Padilla brothers and they were an asset to our department and were all well respected by their fellow firefighters. After retirement they served over twenty years with the Retired Firefighter's Association. Mariano was a pleasant and outgoing person and he always stood ready to teach the new firefighters the finer points of pump operations and fire truck driver safety. We will miss his



great smile and friendly nature. Our sincere condolences and sympathies go out to the entire Padilla family.

AMERICAN LA FRANCE 1920 75 FOOT AERIAL LADDER TRUCK

On April 19, 1915 Fire Chief Jacob Klein submitted his annual report to the City Council and recommended that the City purchase a 75 foot aerial ladder truck. When Fred Russell was Fire Chief in 1919 the City Commission approved \$20,000 to buy a 75 foot motor driven aerial ladder fire truck. It was manufactured in Elmira, New York at the American La France factory The new ladder truck arrived in Albuquerque via the railroad during January, 1920.

The ladder truck was a tillered vehicle. It had a steering wheel in the front and a steering wheel in the back. It had a six cylinder engine, and four solid rubber tires. Included were four kerosine lanterns, and four rubber fire buckets. The siren was hand cranked by a fireman.

The first fire call answered by the new truck was on February 4, 1920 to the Economist store at 308 West Central Avenue. There was a small electrical fire and the firemen quickly extinguished it.

The truck was known as Ladder # 1 and was stationed downtown at station # 1 located at 2nd Street and Tijeras N.W. After 26 years service it was retired in 1946. In the late 1940's it was donated to the City of Morarity, N.M. In the late 1950's it was acquired by the Longhorn Ranch (40 miles east of Albuquerque on 1-40) as a tourist attraction, east of Morarity.

A gentleman who regularly drove between Albuquerque and Amarillo was fascinated by the old fire truck slowly deteriorating outside in the sun with no cover. Mr. Ross Speer was a security administrator for the old Atomic energy Commission in Albuquerque. First he worked for Sandia Labs and then for Pantex Nuclear Weapons assembly plant in Amarillo.

Mr. Speer acquired the truck, got it running and had lots of fun driving it about town, visiting neighbors and showing it off. After Mr. Speer died in 1977 his widow, Roberta Speer, offered the vehicle for sale to the City of Albuquerque. Mayor Ken Schultz and Fire Chief Gerald Grimm agreed on a price of \$7,500 and purchased the truck from Mrs. Speer.

Firefighter Ralph Sedillo was given the job along with Firefighter Pablo Garcia Jr. and Frank Apodaca, AFD maintenance, for the restoration. The City provided time and money for the job. Working from American La France catalogs, Sedillo and his crew used the City maintenance yards on 4th Street to turn the vintage truck into a restored masterpiece.


They had to fabricate new fenders, a steering wheel, reworked the motor, found new solid rubber tires, and gave the entire truck a snappy new red paint job. Ralph said, "there was no pep boys store or local parts store to find parts for the antique truck." The restoration crew led by Ralph Sedillo had to be creative and inventive to put it together. Now the truck is displayed at the fire museum, 11,500 Sunset Gardens S.W. by the Fire Academy.



Herman Bishop story

Jan 15, 1972, a new television series aired "Emergency 51" about the life of firefighters in Los Angeles County California. The casting was designed to show real fire station life with a senior officer (captain) in charge. If you thought the fire captain character would only be found in this Hollywood production,



believe me we know of one. Albuquerque's Fire Departments House Captain at station # 1 Herman Bishop mirrored this character. The term House Captain was used to describe the fire officer in charge of multiple fire companies assigned to one fire station. In the early days at fire station one there were a complement of two engines, one ladder and a rescue unit with minimum manpower assigned of 18 firefighters per shift. Herman held an executive business type look but the demeanor of a close family uncle. Prior to start of shift he gathers all pertinent information including briefing from the captain on the outgoing shift. A structured roll call is made with attentiveness and respect given by all, messages and daily activities are given with his final announcement as he would say the final thing, are you cooking today, Toby? Herman was a sincere friend to all but always maintained the level of person in charge. Herman would remind his officers to hold daily study classes per operating procedures but always hope(d) this would help subordinates in promotional exams.

Herman was promoted to Albuquerque Fire Marshall where it seemed fitting for him to head the office of code enforcement. His first week in FMO to insure he had things in order, Herman understood the mission of FMO he felt the daily activities of the office and staff should be understood first. He found the inspectors and their immediate supervisors were highly talented he also knew all have the heart and emotions of a "firefighter". Although Herman kept his finger on the pulse of the office operation he still believed in the chain of command. So, when a questionable item was brought to his attention Herman knew it could end being a high-profile situation. It was a code citation(s) that was involved in litigation with a business or another governmental entity. One thing Herman instilled was for his inspectors to have proper documentation. When Herman's direct involvement became relevant normally heading toward a legal battle he said its best to try and resolve an issue, but at this stage it was already a moot issue. At times our city legal department would get involved and this also meant the violators had their legal representatives involved and sometimes political contacts. So never a dull office! The fire chief had his thought of rotating his administrative staff which lead_to Herman's next assignment as district chief and assigned to headquarter station at station four. Herman felt I

am back to where I started with, station life. This time a lot more personal involvement with many more firefighters at their stations. Although its all-firefighters responsibilities for safety, you are responsible for many crews who put their lives on the line daily. As district chief Herman had to deal with so many items including disciplinary actions of firefighters which is not a popular subject. However, I've kept in mind the words "disciplinary action" it is normally thought of as a negative. However the metaphor we remember, when you have lemons ,make lemon aid. So I have felt when you have to deal with disciplinary action we all can learn from it. It's never a popular outcome but should resolve the issue and create a learning experience for others. The action involved provides another step in better understanding of rules and regulations which could also springboard into updating or interpretation of a rule Herman said.

As district chief while in route to a fire incident Herman felt confident that his first in officers would make the right decision prior to his arrival. Herman said never try to run an emergency while in route to an incident but acknowledge their verbal size-up and needs. Although as chief you have control of the incident, you never take apart the first in officers' actions/decision just add on to what has transpired, build to mitigate the situation.

Herman always tried to promote the development of firefighters and prepare them for their next level. One morning at 4 AM, Herman's presence was requested by Albuquerque Police, a stolen vehicle that was set on fire the previous day was being investigated. Although this location was in station 10 response district, Herman called for engine one to assist. Herman knew the engine one officer was a driver upgraded to officer. Herman went over all information about the situation with the acting officer and commented to the crew you may have to deal with a similar situation in future years, I felt this is good experience Herman said.

Administration realigned some fire district which moved district headquarters to station number one. Herman was asked by the fire chief to carry out a particular project that would take a lot of time and patience. This was to reorganize all fire department associated material. This became the Albuquerque Fire Department Operating Procedures placed in ten separate volumes.

Herman's Personality

District One Headquarters was moved from station four to station one. Late one evening a fire alarm was transmitted for Commercial SE address which was in district two. All apparatus from station one responding, except for district chief one, district two chief was dispatched. This was a large commercial building used as storage, about 2 hours into the fire, Chief One Herman



Bishop showed up he was not dispatched to the scene. He gets out of the chief's car and said, "hey guys I brought you some hot coffee"! The firefighters were thankful for hot coffee on a cold night but jokingly said, Chief Bishop was lonely in the big station by himself, so he came to visit us. Herman always wanted to maintain a relation with firefighters, that was important to him. When Albuquerque Firefighters traveled to El Paso TX for the annual softball game Herman and wife also attended. With Albuquerque sweeping El Paso Fire the celebration at the host motel was energized with fun. Herman found out rank was not considered protection as he was lifted high in the air by 6 firefighters and launched into the swimming pool. No consideration was given to his new Italian dress shoes. After climbing out of the pool dripping wet, he said I should have known better, but that was fun. Herman had several talents in which he was a closet artist and played a mean harmonica. One Sunday afternoon at station one he asked Eddie Abeita to accompany him on guitar. The instrumental song they recorded was "Me and Bobbie Magee" although it was great it did not hit the music charts top 100.

Herman was district chief for years but thought retirement sure sounds good so it's time to retire. While on duty and returning to headquarters from the fire chiefs office, his last radio transmission was, "Chief one Out of Service and I am retired". Like an old fire horse Herman still was ready to give more of his fire service talents. So, Herman took the fire chief job in Hickory NC, this lasted for approximately 10 years.

After Hickory, Herman returned back to Albuquerque and became historian with AFDRA.

Herman Bishop grew up in a small coal mining town in West Virginia. After a distinguished service in the military, he joined the Albuquerque fire department in 1960. Herman had many accomplishments during his tenure in the fire department, which are two numerous to mention in their entirety. He was responsible for the creation of Bishops Raiders, which was a civil defense organization that functioned through the office of emergency preparedness. Herman also converted the Albuquerque Fire Department operating procedures from a single booklet to a ten volume comprehensive set. After over 25 years of service to the citizens of the city of Albuquerque, Herman retired in 1986. Four short years later he was appointed as the fire chief of a North Carolina fire department. After returning to Albuquerque he was instrumental in helping create the Albuquerque Fire Department Retiree's Association . He has served as their historian for over 20 years and has catalogued numerous documents and photographs, many of which he saved from certain ruin. Additionally he has published many articles on the history of the Albuquerque Fire Department. He truly is a treasure to the community.





The final design went through several phases, and it was finally decided that each bench would represent a different era in AFD/AFR history.

One bench would be painted white and carry the AFD logo used on apparatus into the late 1990s. The other bench would be painted red and represent the current apparatus with the modern AFR logo. Now when you go visit the museum, and need a little rest, you have two 4-foot benches to rest your weary bones on.

Herman, Mike, and I are working to keep the display cases new and fresh, with updated displays every few months. Mike is almost ready to deliver the new display case that will house the Department Redbooks and Rules and Regulation guidelines in a permanent display.

We are very excited about the current and future displays that represent the history of the Albuquerque Fire Department, and we hope that you find the time to tour the museum soon.






PROMOTION AND RECOGNITION CEREMONY

OFFICIALS OF THE ALBUQUERQUE FIRE RESCUE DEPARTMENT WERE JOINED BY MAYOR TIM KELLER TO CONDUCT PROMOTIONAL CEREMONIES

On February 28, 2022 seventy Albuquerque Fire Rescue personnel were promoted in ceremonies held at the Sid cutter Pavilion, Albuquerque balloon Park . Mayor Keller also confirmed Gene Gallegos as Fire Chief, five seasoned veterans were promoted to Deputy Chief, four personnel were promoted to Battalion Chief, twelve personnel were promoted to captain, eleven to Lieutenant and twenty-four to Driver. Emily Jaramillo




The Albuquerque Retired Firefighters Association was established on June 9, 2000 - on the centennial anniversary of the Department's founding - with the stated purpose to "preserve the rights, interests, and welfare of retired members of the Albuquerque Fire Department; to promote sociability and friendship; to keep retirees in touch with the Fire Department Family on a regular basis; and to create and maintain a cohesive, cordial, and warm feeling of friendship between all active members and retirees and their families." The association promotes social events such as an annual summer picnic and Christmas Party - and works at keeping retirees informed through both a phone tree and an e-mail network. A quarterly newsletter provides information about events of interest to Association members, as well as historical material about AFD. To accomplish these goals, the Association strives to maintain a working relationship with the Fire Chief, the Department's Executive Staff, and other department members, in order to promote the success of the Association and its members. There are regularly-scheduled monthly meetings where retirees are able to get together and maintain the bonds of friendships, and the membership is kept informed through a quarterly Association newsletter. In addition to maintaining a current roster of all retirees, the Association also maintains a similar list of all deceased members, each of whom are remembered with a moment of silence at each meeting. A key role of the Association is its commemoration of deceased AFD retirees, through the presentation of a Firefighter Funeral - honoring the deceased for their service to the Department. Included in the ceremony is a special proclamation, as well as the presentation of the "Last Alarm" ceremony. During the service, the Association Honor Guard performs the "Last Alarm" ceremony, ringing the "Four Fives" on an antique fire engine bell - as is traditional within the American Fire Service. Since its inception, the Association has recognized more than 100 AFD Retirees with the service. The bell ceremony has also used in the annual Archdiocese of Santa Fe "Blue Mass" and at the City of Albuquerque's annual September 11 memorial. Association members also volunteer to assist in the Albuquerque Fire Department's annual Rio Grande bosque patrol activities, in support of the Department's Open Space fire prevention plans. Members staff bike patrols during the high fire danger seasonwhen the bosque is otherwise closed to the public.


