



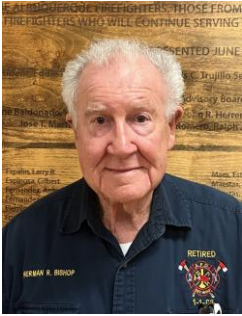

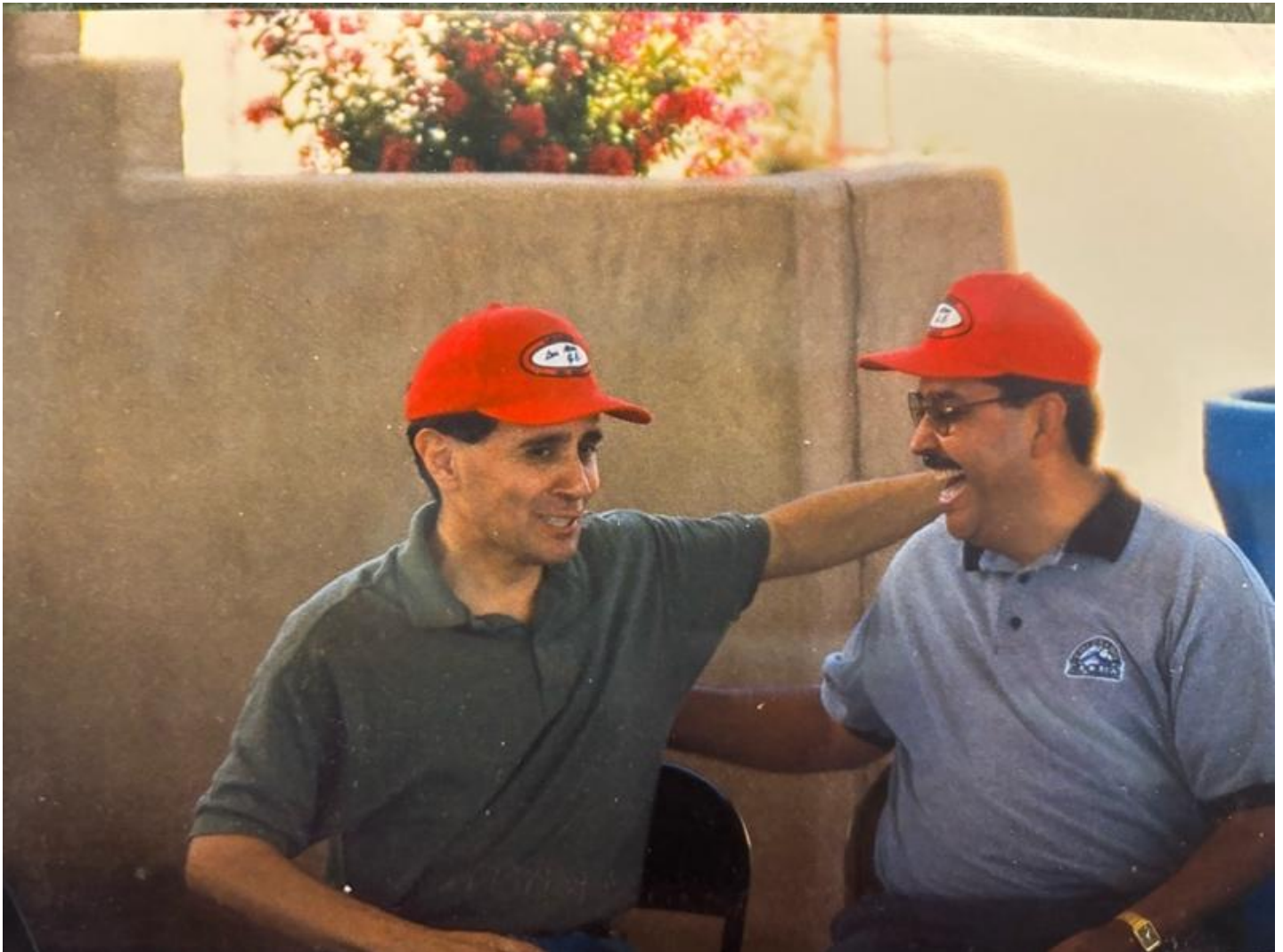

Trauma: *What Remains When the Job is Done*

(Second in a series on Trauma by Patrick McKinney)



When firefighters hear the word trauma, they often think of a specific call—a fatal fire, a serious accident, a child who did not survive. But trauma is not defined by the

event itself. Two people can experience the same incident, and one may carry long-lasting effects while the other does not. Many retired firefighters recognize this when they move through Albuquerque long after the job is done. A familiar intersection, a stretch of highway, a neighborhood street, or the sight of a roadside descanso can bring an old call...a memory back without warning. Driving across town, running errands, or taking a familiar route, there are often few places that don't carry some association with a past call.

Understanding trauma begins with understanding how it is defined and, more importantly, how it is experienced—personally, uniquely, and over time.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) defines trauma as the result of an event, series of events, or set of circumstances that is experienced by an individual as physically or emotionally harmful or life-threatening and has lasting adverse effects on a person's functioning and well-being. Another working definition builds on this by emphasizing experience over exposure:

- ***Trauma occurs when an event overwhelms a person's ability to cope, creates helplessness or hopelessness, and exists outside what the nervous system understands as a normal or safe world.***

This distinction matters because trauma is subjective. It is not measured by how dramatic or severe an incident appears from the outside. The nervous system does not evaluate trauma based on training, rank, experience, or toughness. It responds to perceived threat and lack of control. Two firefighters may work the same call, but their nervous systems may experience it very differently depending on timing, exhaustion, previous exposure, and internal resources at that moment.

Helplessness and hopelessness are central ingredients in trauma. Firefighters are trained to act, intervene, and solve problems. Trauma often forms when action

is impossible, when outcomes cannot be changed, or when human limits are painfully clear. In those moments, the nervous system records not just what happened, but the felt sense that nothing could be done and nothing would make a difference. That internal experience can linger long after the call ends.

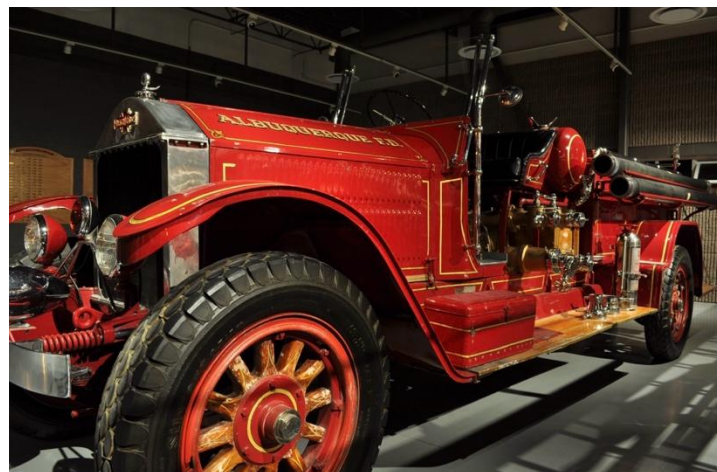
In many calls, firefighters step briefly into a world where the usual rules don't apply—where fairness breaks down and outcomes feel random. In that space, decisions carry weight, time feels compressed, and the margin for error is small. We do the work

that needs to be done, then step back into everyday life where people are shopping, driving, laughing, and moving on as if nothing unusual has occurred. The transition can be abrupt. There is often no gradual reentry, no pause to process what just happened. The shift moves on—the truck is restocked, reports are finished, tones drop, the next call begins—but the body does not always reset at the same pace. Life continues around them, while the nervous system is still registering what it just carried. The mind may orient to the next task, but the body often carries the experience forward.

Trauma also tends to live “***outside the normal world.***” It violates expectations about safety, predictability, and fairness. Many firefighters instinctively compartmentalize these experiences because they do not fit into everyday life. Compartmentalization is not a flaw or a failure—it is a practical survival skill. It

allows firefighters to set something aside so they can return to service, focus on the next call, and keep functioning in environments that demand clarity and control. The mind may move on, but the nervous system holds onto what it does not know how to place. Understanding trauma as an experience rather than a failure is often the first step toward reducing shame and self-blame.



In the next article, we'll explore how firefighters often become co-participants in trauma over the course of a career—not as victims, but as observers and to a degree participants to thousands of intense human experiences. We'll also begin looking at how trauma is absorbed through the senses and stored by the brain long before it is understood by the mind.

AFD HISTORY (Part 1)

The first reference to an organized fire brigade dates back to 4000 B.C. in China. By 2000 B.C. Egypt had an organization for fighting fires. The great London fire of 1660 destroyed London Bridge and resulted in the passing of a building code and fire regulations. In the United States organized fire departments were popular early as 1653.

Boston had the first real fire organization by 1715. They had six fire companies. During the 1850's New York and Cincinnati had paid firemen. Albuquerque has had an organized Fire Department since the late 1800's. At that time the firemen were volunteer including the Fire Chief. The Chief usually was a local businessman.

We don't know the exact date of the organization of the first Albuquerque Fire Department. An old photo dated February, 1882 of the "Albuquerque Fire Company," a hook and ladder company in front of the Montezuma saloon was taken prior to the incorporation of Albuquerque in 1885. The ladder wagon was hand-drawn. The saloon was located at the SW corner of Second



Street and Railroad Avenue (Central Avenue)

The Albuquerque Morning Journal on February 24, 1882, reported that the Albuquerque volunteer hook and ladder company was headed by Chief William Sanguinette. It was reported that "The Hook and Ladder Company" is efficient but a better water supply is needed. A big fire was reported on March 9, 1882. "The pump of the R.R. news Company proved of much service. The pump was used to fill hundreds of buckets.

On July 13, 1882 William Sanguinette was re-elected to Chief. The Fire Company name was changed from "Albuquerque Fire Company" to "Albuquerque Hook and Ladder Company." John Borradiale was named Foreman, and James Blanchard was named Secretary. Names of inactive members were removed from the membership roster.

From a newspaper column entitled "Nubs of News" on October 8, 1882, it was reported that "The fire boys are erecting a building for a new truck on Front Street (First Street) opposite Holiday and Sanguinette Saloon."

The first Fireman's Ball was held on March 17, 1883, and the men wore their uniforms. The lady's attire was not reported and the name of the Band is not known. The location of the Fireman's Ball is unknown or the number attending. The Firemen received their first badges on April 7, 1883.

A Railroad Fire Company was organized on August 12, 1883. It was called the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad Company in those days. At this time the fire company tested its first fire hose and the test proved successful.

A City Water Works Company was proposed on August 17, 1883. At that time the City Water Company was not sufficient to supply fire hydrants, but the hand-drawn fire carts and horse drawn fire wagons carried their own water. On September 28, 1883 a bad fire was reported at the Hub Saloon. No further information was provided. Later in the year on December 8th an improved Water Works Company was decided upon. Then on December 11, 1883 the King Building sustained heavy losses after a big fire.

The Maden Store suffered heavy fire losses on April 22, 1884. A new type of ladder was purchased and arrived on June 13, 1884. It was called a "Fire Escape Ladder" (extension ladder) This ladder apparently was similar to a 40 foot Bangor ladder. It was described as having sections held together by brackets which allowed the sections upward and downward mobility. The first fireman's tournament was held on October 3, 1884.

The election of June 1885 allowed the citizens to vote on whether or not to incorporate Albuquerque as a town. The citizens voted in the majority to incorporate. Just five days after the election a contract for installation of a city water system was awarded.

William Sanguinette was re-elected Chief, and the first hose company was organized during November 3, 1885. This hose company was comprised of 23 volunteer members. Two hose carts were approved for purchase by the City Commission during December, 1885. Also awarded in the contract for the two hose carts was 1200 feet of 2 1/2 inch fire hose. The name "Scott Moore Hose Company" was adopted for the first hose company in early January, 1886.

To provide fire service to the south Albuquerque area, on January 18, 1886, a second hose company was organized. The name, "A.A. Grant Hose Company" was adopted. At this time the ladder company was known as the "Albuquerque Hook and Ladder Company" The company's fifteen volunteer members elected C.E. Cramer as Foreman.

The two new Gleason and Bailey two-wheel hose carts arrived on February 15, 1886. The "Scott Moore Company" hose cart was cream colored and the "A.A. Grant Hose Company" was colored brown. (The wheels on the cart measured 6' 3")



On February 15, 1886, Volunteer members of both hose companies, "Scott Moore", and "A.A. Grant" held their first practice drill along with the "Albuquerque Hook and Ladder Company." Although the water works was not complete at this time the volunteers were able to hold their drill with hoses hooked up to new fire hydrants. The drills were reported a success by all three companies.

An election was held in March 1886 and William Sanguinette was elected Fire Marshal by members of the three fire companies. 1- "Scott Moore Hose Company

" 2- "A.A. Grant Hose Company." 3 - "Albuquerque Hook and Ladder Company"

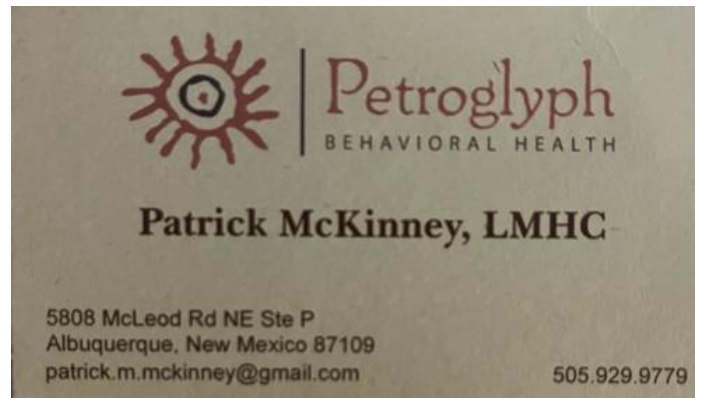
Picnic Committee, as stated, the date of the picnic is set for August 22nd, so make your plans to attend. The location is at Rotary Park in Bernalillo.
